


Coffee Mornings.



Scams and Hacking

As those of you who received an email from someone **purporting** to be me may be aware, my personal email account was hacked recently. One of the main reasons the u3a now uses Beacon is to protect personal data, but as chair I like to be accessible, so I do put my personal details out there.

Unfortunately I had not tidied up my old email account that I used to use as coordinator of the garden group. I have had to change all my passwords and clean up all the data on my computer. Research showed the emails originated in Nigeria!

Even more unfortunately some people have been drawn into the scam and have sent money to the sob story that clicking the link on the email generated, and of course their email is now compromised.

Some lessons to be learned:

- These hackers are very clever, my password was complicated, the story was devious. The spelling and punctuation was poor, but then mine is not brilliant!
- NEVER send money or buy gift cards (this is the latest ruse because there is no come back at the bank) for anyone whom you have not personally talked to.
- When you send emails to multiple people use bcc (blind copy) so that their emails are not visible (coordinators especially note ...or use beacon)
- Be aware ... they are always looking for a chink they can exploit!
