In our February meeting we will show another of the London Gresham College lectures.

"Living with the Forever Chemicals" by Dr Ian Mudway

The forever chemicals, or PFAS (Per- and polyfluorinated alkyl substances) represent a large family of highly persistent synthetic chemicals widely used in everything from carpets to non-stick cookware, from firefighting foams to the clothes we are wearing.

For the first time in history we are all living with these chemicals in our bodies. What does this mean for the future of mankind?

Come and watch this challenging talk – and join in our discussions over tea and coffee afterwards.

#### **Archaeology Group**

The Derbyshire Archaeology Day in January was excellent, and I know those who were able to be in Chesterfield greatly enjoyed the event.

Just to give you a flavour, the day was very busy with eight separate topics over six hours. Following Megan we were updated about a site which has yielded evidence of four generations of Roman burials from the 2nd century at a site just north of Chesterfield.

After a short break, there were two presentations, the first being a new henge site at Sheldon which had been revealed by LiDAR. Similarly in size to Arbor Low the archaeologists from Sheffield University spoke about the detailed revealing of the site although there was nothing to show on the surface the presence of the prehistory. My own favourite of the day was the DNA analysis of the skeletal remains from Buxton Museum.

Lunch provided a good chance to chat with those making the presentations

and other people in the county. The afternoon was equally busy with an update about the ongoing dig at Oxcroft lane, Bolsover. An excellent presentation from York University archaeologists about a small site next to a recently built Lidl at Shirebook. This was followed by an energetic presentation about MSDS Marine archaeological surveys and the day ended with details of a dig at Agard Street in Derby of an old Baptist Chapel again organised by York.

An excellent day enjoyed by a sell out audience. I have order copies of ACID magazine again for the group which I will have available for **our next meeting on 22nd February at my house**, hope to see as many as possible as we plan our programme for the year. 'Threads through Creation' is an astonishing textile art exhibition showing at Sheffield Cathedral from now until 2nd March. Some people may have seen it featured last week on ITV Calendar. It might be a bit of a journey for some, but it's probably right up their street for many u3a people - a real treat for anyone interested in the applied arts, textile art and sewing. The show is touring twenty cathedrals. We've had a lot of positive feedback from U3A groups all over the country. It consists of twelve beautiful silk panels re-imagining the story of creation from the bible. They're huge – 2.7m high, up to nearly 4m wide. It's one of the largest textile art projects by a single artist, ever. It took artist Jacqui Parkinson three years - and eight million stitches! You'll find the huge scale, vibrant colours, dramatic and complex designs truly breathtaking.
