Matlock Civic Association has arranged an illustrated talk by Jane Middleton-Smith, the archivist at John Smedley, on the history of Riber Castle.

Entry is free and everyone is welcome to attend. The talk will

tell the story of the castle since it was built as a family home for John Smedley in the 1860s up to the present day. It has since been a boys' school, a World War 2 food store and a zoo. It is now being restored as apartments.
