MAU3A has had yet another very successful year. The membership has grown and now stands at 638 with an increase in the number of groups, now standing at more than 50. The new groups this year are Boules deux and trois, Boules d'hiver, Cars and Motoring, Geography, Short Walks, Sign Language 2 and the Film Club. Of course, the launch of the new groups would never have happened without members offering to coordinate them, so a big thank you from the Management Committee. As always the Management Committee will endeavour to accommodate new members by keeping waiting lists and to help start up new groups. At the 2016 AGM, the members elected onto the Management Committee were Barbara Phelan to Chair, Helen Boocock to Business Secretary, Penny Ackland to Website Manager, Dave Puxley to Publicity Officer and Peter Hume. A list of the 2016 Management Committee is found on the cover page. At the next AGM there will be changes to the Committee due to the retirements of Bea Jagger (Communications and Derbyshire Network Rep), Jenny McEwan (Membership Secretariat) and Fred Rosendell (Membership Secretariat); thank you for your commitment during your time on the Committee. As a result of these retirements there will be changes within the Management Committee and so nominations are required for the following positions; Vice Chair, Membership Secretariat, Derbyshire Network Representative and two additional members. We welcome applications from all members, as we need a fully functional Committee in order to continue.

Again the Social Committee has organised a comprehensive range of events. The prime purpose is, of course, for members to meet and socialise with each other, as well as being informed. The monthly Coffee Mornings have become one of the main avenues and some groups have demonstrated their skills at these meetings. New groups are launched and possible members come to join. "What's On" is distributed on a monthly basis by email and those members without email are sent a hard copy. We are very fortunate that the majority of members have email and we only have to send hard copies to less than 50 members. The social events that have taken place this year have been: -

- A visit to Chester on 15th June, a visit to York organised by Art Appreciation and
- A visit to Jodrell Bank in September organised by Science and Technology.

Last year the MAU3A had its Annual General Meeting on 21st March and 134 members came to the meeting and to hear our speaker, Bill Tidy MBE. He is a cartoonist, writer and television personality known chiefly for his comic strips and I'm sure that we all enjoyed his lovely sense of humour and his cartoons. Please support our AGM this year on 10th April. It is being held at the Whitworth Centre where they have a loop system for the hard of hearing. Our speaker this year will be Matthew Parris, a political writer and formerly a Conservative Member of Parliament.

Finally I would like to thank all of the members of the Management Committee for the work and time that they willingly give to make MAU3A a friendly and welcoming organisation; also to all of the members for supporting us.
